The Goal of Social Studies

Responsible citizenship is the ultimate goal of Social Studies. Citizenship education is based upon an understanding of:

- history in relation to current affairs
- diversity between people and places
- perspectives towards decision-making and economies
- connecting locally and globally.

It is organized around knowledge and skill-building, however its primary focus is the development of your values and attitudes. This is necessary for lifelong learning.

What will we study in this course?

Students will

- analyze the relationship between Canada's political and legislative processes and their impact on issues connected to governance, rights, citizenship and identity.
- explore issues of economics and their impact on quality of life, citizenship and identity in Canada and the United States.

Why do we study the following areas?

This course will allow students to broaden their understanding and appreciation of the relationships among governance, economics, quality of life, citizenship and identity.

General Outcome 1 ~Issues for Canadians: Governance and Rights

Students will demonstrate an understanding and appreciation of how Canada's political processes impact citizenship and identity in an attempt to meet the needs of all Canadians.

Students will:

- □ appreciate the impact of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms on rights and governance in Canada.
- □ appreciate the various effects of government policies on citizenship and on Canadian society.
- □ appreciate how emerging issues impact quality of life, citizenship, and identity in Canada.

Students will demonstrate an understanding and appreciation of how economic decision making in Canada and the United States impacts quality of life, citizenship and identity.
